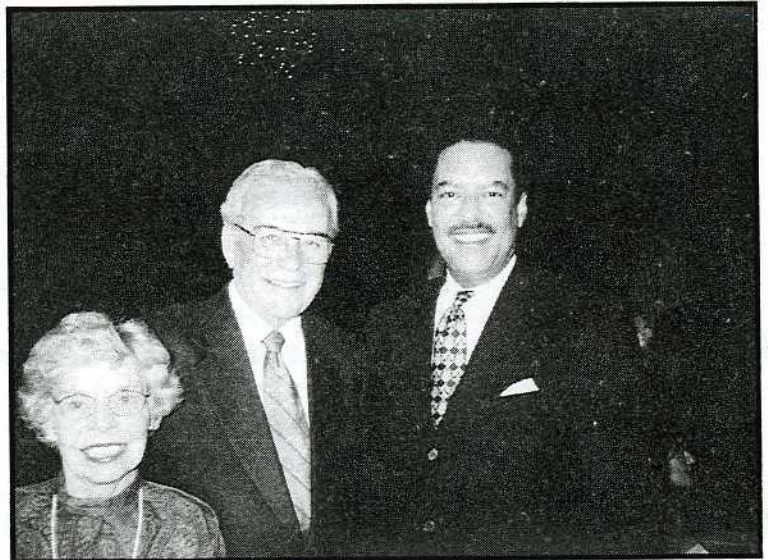

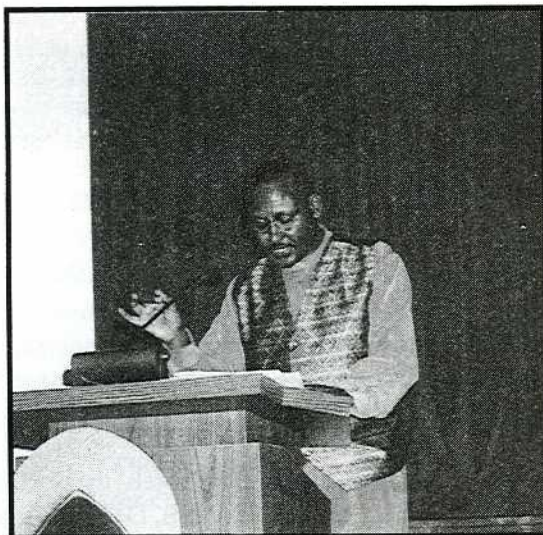
Middle States African Studies Association holds its first conference in Charleston, West Virginia

The Middle States African Studies Association (MSASA) held its first conference at the Cultural Center in Charleston, WV from March 23-26, 2000. The conference titled, "Shadow of the Past," was held in conjunction with "A Slave Ship Speaks: The Wreck of the Henrietta Marie" tangible artifacts exhibit sponsored by WV Governor Cecil H. Underwood, All-AID International, General Motors and others.

The MSASA conference was organized by the history department at West Virginia State College. The three-day event included concurrent panel sessions, keynote presentations, luncheons, a reception at the house of WVSC President Hazo W. Carter Jr.--a special thanks to Mrs. Carter--and an African soiree. Special presenters and keynote guests included: Ayele Bekerie, Cornell University; Vilbert White, University of Illinois-Springfield; Robert Shell, Rhodes University, South Africa; Dinizulu Gene Tinnie, Miami-Dade Community College; and Ric Powell, Founder of the National Association of Black Scuba Divers.

The focal point of the conference was the official opening of the Henrietta Marie Slave Ship exhibit that will be on display for the next three months at the Charleston Cultural Center. All-AID International and Governor Underwood hosted a gala event the evening of March 24th. At the end of the program, the guests were invited to join the governor in a premier look at the exhibit which officially opened to the public the following morning.

Scholars from the US, Africa, and the Caribbean presented papers and engaged in intellectual debate concerning the African diaspora during the three day conference. Professors Anna Marie Evans, Lois Lucas, William Drennen, and History Department Chair, Stuart McGehee are making plans for next year.

WVSC Travel Courses: Summer 2000

Study Tour to Egypt May 19-June 4

Egypt, The Land of Ancient Khemet: This travel course offers a unique multicultural experience. The emphasis will be on the exploration of Ancient Egypt and its influence on Western Civilization and Christianity. In addition, the tour will encounter the cultures of Islam, the Coptics, and Nubia. Participants may earn 1-3 hours of academic credit by enrolling in Sociology 445 or Philosophy 445 during the Summer Session 2000 at the standard tuition rate. Students wishing to enroll for academic credit must first complete an interview with the instructor.

The tour is scheduled for May 19-June 4, 2000, at a cost of \$2700 per person/double occupancy. Registration for the tour ends April 10, 2000. London Theatre Study Tour July

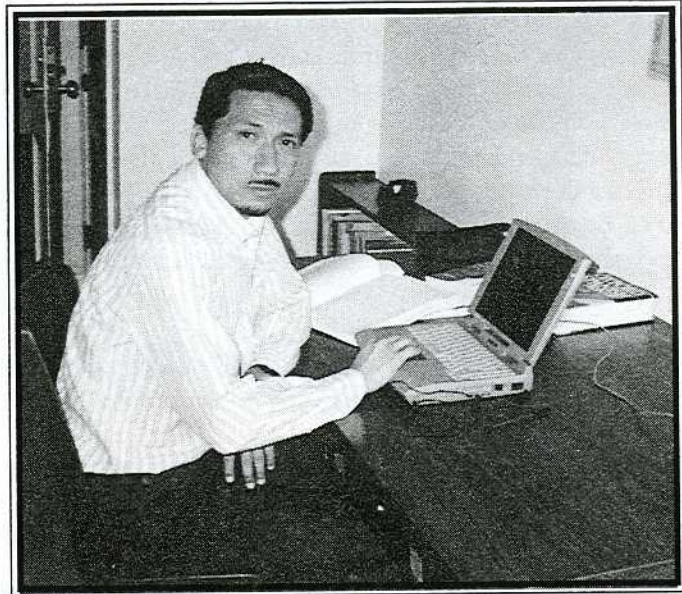

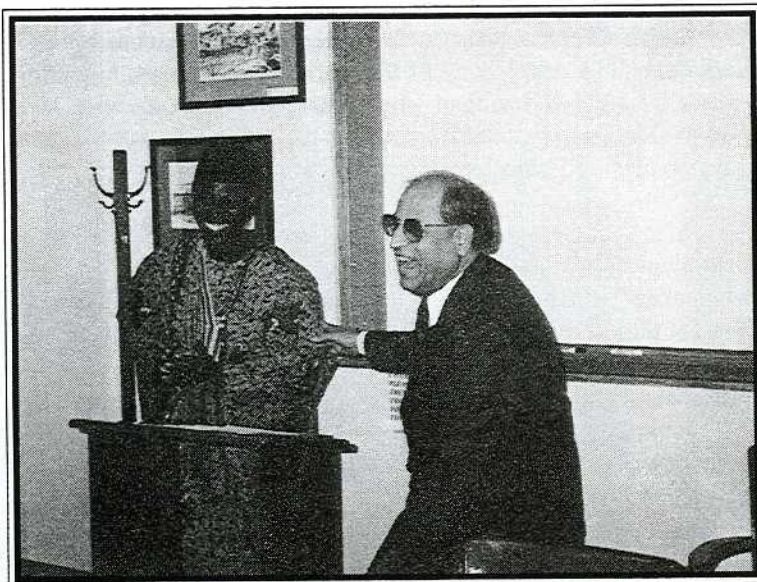
Welcomes Visiting Resident Scholar from the University of Mexico

Dr. Jorge Gonzalez-Galvan will be in residence at West Virginia State College on a one-year sabbatical as Research Associate in the Social Sciences. Dr. Galvan holds the doctorate degree in Sociology of Law from the University of Law, Economics and Social Science in Paris. He is a Professor of Law and a researcher at the Institute of Legal Research at the University of Mexico (UNAM), a member of the National System of Researchers, and professor of "Methodology and Techniques of Legal Research" of the Postgraduate School of Law at the University of Mexico. His area of specialization is the "Law of Indigenous People." In 1995, he received the "Award of Distinction for Young Academicians" from the National University in the area of social science research.
